

# Informal networks may use corruption to solve problems or achieve specific goals

Access public services

Increase business profitability

Win elections

## Informal networks are embedded in socio-political, economic and cultural structures

They are rooted in trust, reciprocity and common social norms



### These networks involve different roles and tasks













### Informal networks rely on:



Co-optation (recruitment and trust-building)



Control (discipline and compliance)



Camouflage (concealment and legitimacy)



Coordination (task orchestration)

### Lessons from the enemy

Set tangible goals that address the needs of participants

Recruit strategically – Who needs to be at the table? What's their role?

Keep participants committed using peer pressure and reputational incentives
